American Desi hopes to be the new box-office beauty

LOS ANGELES: Indian-American cinema will make a rare foray into the U.S. mainstream on Friday when the romantic comedy "American Desi" opens in theatres.

The low-budget film marks the first English-language release by Eros International, the largest distributor of Indian movies outside India.

"American Desi," written and directed by rookie filmmaker Piyush Dinker Pandya, revolves around Indian-American college students who try to balance their Eastern heritage with their Western upbringing.

Deep Katdare plays a young man who must rediscover his culture in order to win a girl's heart.

The film, which cost about \$250,000 to make, will open in 35 markets across North America, playing in both specialist Indian theatres and regular arthouse theatres, said Ken Naz, chief executive officer of Eros Entertainment, the North American arm of London-based Eros International.

"This is a very experimental film for us," Naz told Reuters in a recent interview.

Naz recalled going through "literal hell" persuading "totally unmotivated" owners of Indian movie theatres to book his movie. Indian audiences traditionally prefer big popcorn extravaganzas with song and dance routines, he said.

Desi" in part to give some much-needed encouragement to South Asian filmmakers in the United States.

One of America's hottest directors happens to be Indian: M. Night Shyamalan, who was born in Madras and raised in Philadelphia. His 1999 thriller "The Sixth Sense" became one of the biggest films in U.S. history.

Naz said Shyamalan's success has been "a great inspiration" for fledgling Indian filmmakers.

Eros' biggest film to date in the United States is the 1999 Hindi-language release "Taal," which grossed about \$2 million at the box office.

Naz said there was a good chance "American Desi" could break that record, but he declined to make any bold predictions.

The film has a built-in target audience of college kids, and Naz hoped positive word-of-mouth would help it reach other demographics as well. To that end, Eros has courted key film critics and held advance screenings.

Eros is also in talks with several record labels to release a soundtrack album within a month. The CD will include the David Bowie track "Young Americans," which plays a key part in the film.

Eros expects to begin the British release in April or May, followed by continental Europe.

Meanwhile Pandya, a 32-year-old filmmaker born in the United States, has teamed up with his star, Katdare, to co-write an untitled action-crime script.

Purva Bedi, who plays the object of Katdare's affections, has appeared on such popular television shows as the hospital emergency room drama "ER" and the political drama set in the White House "The West Wing," while co-star Anil Kumar is currently on Broadway in "The Tale of the Allergist's Wife."
